## 4. FIRST AID MEASURES

<b>General information</b>	You should call The Poisons Information Centre if you feel that you may have been poisoned, burned or irritated by this product. 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<b>Eye contact</b>	Immediately flush the contaminated eye(s) with lukewarm, gently flowing water while holding the eyelid(s) open. Obtain medical attention if irritation persists. Take special care if exposed person is wearing contact lenses

<b>Suitable extinguishing media</b>	Not combustible. Use extinguishing media suited to surrounding fire.
<b>Specific hazards arising from the chemical</b>	The major hazard in fires is usually inhalation of heated and toxic or oxygen deficient (or both), fire gases. There is no risk of an explosion from this product under normal circumstances if it is involved in a fire. Fire decomposition products from this product may be toxic if inhaled. <b>Hazardous decomposition products</b>	Combustion forms carbon dioxide, and if incomplete, carbon monoxide and possibly smoke. Water is also formed. May form nitrogen and its compounds, and under some circumstances, oxides of nitrogen. Occasionally hydrogen cyanide gas in reducing atmospheres. May form oxides of sulphur



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(sulphur dioxide is a respiratory hazard) and other sulphur compounds. Most will have a foul odour. Carbon monoxide poisoning produces headache, weakness, nausea, dizziness, confusion, dimness of vision, disturbance of judgment, and unconsciousness followed by coma and death.
